### **TEXAS SOUTHERN CHOOSES DISHMAN:**

Texas Southern University Vice President for

Dishman

Intercollegiate Athletics Dr. Kevin **Granger** announced Friday the hiring of former NFL all-pro cornerback Cris Dishman as the school's 18th head football coach.

A two-time NFL Pro-Bowl selection, Dishman, 58, a Louisville, Ky. native, comes to TSU after 13 successful years in the NFL and 19 years of coaching experience at the collegiate and profes-

sional levels. Dishman's selection follows a deliberative eight-week process that began as Granger and the university's Board of Regents reportedly considered as many as three other candidates to replace Clarence McKinney. They included Granger's initial recommendation of Fred McNair, the former eight-year Alcorn State head coach who stepped down leading the Braves after the 2023 season, former NFL all-pro receiver **Andre Johnson** and most recently

former Pittsburgh Steelers wide receiver Hines Ward.

"Cris Dishman is an experienced football coach whose accomplishments as a player and coach make him an excellent choice to lead our football program into the future," Granger said. "Even more important, he is a man of character who, in his own words, 'seeks to make his players into better brothers, fathers, and husbands. I appreciate the Board of Regents' bold, strategic approach to finding new opportunities to elevate Texas Southern University. I look forward to working with Coach Dishman to bring new levels of success to TSU Football."

Dishman comes to TSU after spending the last two seasons as Defensive Coordinator of the XFL's Las Vegas Vipers. Prior to joining the Vipers, he spent the 2022 season as the defensive coordinator for the USFL's New Jersey Generals.

"I want everyone in Tigerland to know that we're going to put together a good team, a good staff, and everyone has to do their job and be all in for TSU football," Dish-

After earning a Bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice from Purdue, he was drafted by the Houston Oilers in the fifth round of the 1988 Draft. Dishman played eight years with the Oilers, two years with the Washington Commanders and Kansas City Chiefs, and his final season with the Minnesota Vikings.

Dishman entered coaching as the defensive backs coach for the NFL Europe's Berlin Thunder in 2004, was a defensive back intern for the Oakland Raiders (2005 and 2007), the Miami Dolphins (2006), and Arizona Cardinals (2017). From 2006-2008, he served as the defensive coordinator (secondary) at Menlo College. He also served as the assistant defensive back coach for the San Diego Chargers (2008-2013).

He recently had positions as a defensive backs coach at Baylor with the Montreal Alouettes of the CFL, at Mc-Neese State and with the XFL's New York Guardians.

# Shawn Gibbs re-ups at FVSU:

In the midst of speculation that second-year Fort

Valley State Head Football Coach Shawn Gibbs was the choice of Florida A&M Athletics Director Tiffany-Dawn Sykes to be the next head football coach of the Rattlers, it was announced Monday that he has renewed his contract with the Wildcats.

**Gibbs** FVSU Director of Athletics Dr. Renae Myles Payne announced that Gibbs will remain a Wildcat in a message posted on the FVSU X (formerly Twitter) page at almost 10 pm on Monday, January 15th.

"I am excited to announce that coach Shawn Gibbs officially renewed his agreement with FVSU. President **Paul Jones**, and I, in collaboration with the Fort Valley State Athletic Association, are happy to have Coach Gibbs leading our Wildcat football program," Myles-Payne's X statement read. The post told of Gibbs "reaffirming his commitment to our Wildcats in the face of opportunities elsewhere."

Gibbs was a highly successfully running backs coach under head coach Rod Broadway at North Carolina Central (2003-2006), Grambling State (2007-2010) and **North Carolina A&T** (2011-2017). He then spent another four years under **Sam Washington** at A&T (2018-2021) before taking over as head coach at FVSU in 2022.

The former NCCU running back (1993-97) has led the Wildcats to 7-4 and 8-3 marks during his two years at the helm and into the thick of the race for SIAC championships. His 2023 team scored a 23-10 win over CIAA representative **Johnson C. Smith** in the inaugural postseason Florida Beach Bowl in mid-December.

VSU has won five straight with its only loss to FSU (78-69) back on Dec. 16. FSU has won nine straight with its only loss a 58-56 loss to Lander on Nov. 25. VSU was 11th and FSU 22nd in the latest WBCA national Div.

VSU is paced by Tiyanna James's 14.0 ppg. and league rebounding leader Amesha Miller's 8.5 rpg. FSU's Aniylah Bryant is third in the CIAA at 16.9 ppg. Morgan Graham's 8.0 caroms per game leads the Lady
