

### TEAM GAITHER WINS, DAVIUS RICHARD **INJURED AT HBCU LEGACY BOWL:**

Team Gaither, a squad primarily made up of draft-



eligible players from the CIAA and MEAC, defeated Team Robinson, primarily made up of similar players from the SWAC and SIAC, 10-6 in Saturday's 3rd annual Allstate HBCU Legacy Bowl played at Tulane's Yulman Stadium in New Orleans.

The game was televised by

the NFL Network and culminated a week of activities that allowed the 100 players to showcase their skills before a host of pro scouts from both the NFL and CFL. Additionally, the players got a chance to experience New Orleans culture and cuisine that included a New Orleans Pelicans NBA game, get advice and counsel from a number of NFL veterans and Hall of Famers and participate in a Career Fair at the New Orleans Convention Center that acquainted them with job opportunities inside and outside of professional football.

The game, presented by the Black College Football Hall of Fame and hosted by BCFHOF founders, former Grambling State and NFL quarterbacks James "Shack" Harris and Doug Williams, went off before a crowd that nearly filled the bottom half of the 30,000-seat stadium.

While the offenses struggled to establish much rhythm,



the defenses shined in Saturday's game. Despite playing for the team named for legendary former Grambling Head Coach Eddie Robinson that came up on the short end of the score, Alabama A&M defensive line prospect Za'Reon Hayes was named the game's Defensive MVP. Hayes repeatedly found ways into the Gaither team's backfield and was

credited with three sacks but actually had four in the game.

Other standouts included Howard guarterback Quinton Williams who completed 10 of 25 passes for a game-best 125 yards for the winning squad named for legendary former Florida A&M Head Coach Alonzo "Jake" Gaither. Howard teammate **Ian Wheeler** led the squads with 42 rushing yards

## **CIAA first up on Tourney Schedule**

The 79th men's and 50th women's Food Lion CIAA Tournaments tipped off Monday in Baltimore's CFG Bank Arena, their fourth trip to the Charm City after a 15-year stay in Charlotte, N.C.

The tournaments open with clear favorites on the women's side and no clear top choice for the men.

#### WOMEN

Fayetteville State, at 24-2 overall, 17-1 in CIAA play and 13-1 in South Division competition, comes in as the South's top seed and favorite to take the title. The Lady Broncos were ranked 15th in the WBCA Div. II Top 20 in their Feb. 20 poll and third in the Atlantic Region.

Elizabeth City State (18-10, 10-7, 8-2) is the North's top seed. North 2nd seed Virginia State (22-4, 13-4, 7-3) is 25th in the WBCA national rankings and seventh in the Atlantic Region.

FSU, ECSU and VSU would have to be top picks to leave with Saturday's women's title.

#### MEN

It is a little more difficult to pick who will come out with the title from the men's bracket.

The top seeds are Lincoln Pa. (14-13, 10-7, 13-3) from the North Division and Fayetteville State (16-12, 11-7, 8-4) from the South. Lincoln lost three of its final five games in the division. Both Lincoln and FSU have seven losses against CIAA competition. That brings a host of others into the championship mix.

South 2nd-seed Claflin (16-9, 8-4 S) and South 3rd-seed WSSU (19-9, 7-5 S) have the best records in CIAA play at 13-5. Virginia Union (13-17, 8-9 CIAA), the 2nd seed from the North, had an identical 7-3 division mark as Lincoln and knocked off the Lions (82-53) early

#### **ON THE COURT**

The tournaments began Monday with teams at the bottom of the respective brackets facing off against each other.

South 7th-seed Winston-Salem State scored a 64-61 win over North 6th-seed Bowie State in women's play.

In the men's opening contest, North 6thseed Bluefield State, in its first tournament game since returning to the conference, defeated South 7th-seed St. Augustine's 50-48

Play continued Tuesday with four women's games at 10 am, 12:10, 2:20 and 4:30 p.m. Two men's games are scheduled for 6:40 and 8:50 p.m.

The No. 1 seeds get into action during Wednesday's quarterfinals.

On the women's side, ECSU takes on the St. Aug's/Lincoln winner at 2:20 p.m. followed by FSU facing the Bluefield State/Livingstone winner at 4:30 p.m.

For the men, FSU meets the Bowie State/ Livingstone winner at 6:40 p.m. Lincoln faces the winner of Shaw vs. Eliz. City St. at 8:50 p.m.

The women and men 2nd seeds will alternate games in Thursday's quarterfinals. The Claffin women take the court at 12 noon followed by the Claffin men at 2 p.m. The VSU women play at 6 p.m. followed by the VUU men at 8 p.m.

Alternating games will also be played in Friday's semifinals with the women playing at 12 noon and 6 p.m. and the men hitting the court at 2 and 8 p.m.

The women's championship game is set for 1 p.m. Saturday with the men's title game to follow at 4 p.m.

on eight carries. Elizabeth City State wide receiver Quinzel Lockhart had a game-high four receptions for 48 yards.

The Offensive MVP award went to North Carolina Central quarterback Davius Richard who was unfortunately injured in the game's opening possession. The two-time MEAC Offensive Player of the Year led the Gaither team on a 5-play, 76-yard drive for its only touchdown of the game completing his only two passes for 52 yards. He capped the drive with a 3-yard scoring run off a run-pass option but was awkwardly twisted and tackled in the end zone with the defender falling on top of him. He stayed down for several minutes while the medical staff fitted his right leg with an air cast. His injury has been diagnosed as a dislocated right ankle.

NCCU Head Coach Trei Oliver, who was present at the game, was critical of the decision to let Richard run the ball, as were many in attendance.

"I promise he would not have played if I knew that those ----- coaches were going to run him! He should never have left the pocket. You want to run, hand it off to those all-American backs. Make it make sense," Oliver was quoted as saying to Kyle Mosley of HBCU Legends.

The injury could not have come at a worst time for Richard, a 6-3, 215-pounder from Belle Glade, Florida. He was named Friday as the 2023 co-recipient of the BCFHOF's Deacon Jones Award as the Black College Player of the Year along with Florida A&M quarterback Jeremy Moussa. Richard also won the award in 2022. A dual-threat QB with 44 rushing TDs during his NCCU career, Richard came to practices and the bowl game hoping to impress the scouts with his passing skills and ability to run a pro-style offense.

He ran a great time of 4.5 seconds in the 40-yard dash at Monday's HBCU Combine and displayed touch and accuracy in passing drills. His stock was up following his workouts.

How the injury will affect his draft status is unclear. Recovery time for the injury is projected to be six months meaning he will not likely be fully healed by the opening of NFL training camps this summer.

Charles Davis, an NFL Media Analyst, who was on hand all week and called the game for the NFL Network, singled out Hayes, Richard, South Carolina State defensive tackle Jablonski Green, Florida A&M linebacker Isaiah Major, North Carolina A&T offensive tackle Tariq Stewart and Morgan State safety Jordan Toles as players "who consistently performed at a level that should have the attention of NFL scouts."

Davis also gave Honorable Mention to DB Cedrick Anderson of Grambling, DL Darrian Brokenburr of Howard, DT Loobert Denelus of Benedict, RB LaDarius Owens of Texas Southern and DB Eric Smith of FAMU.

The Norfolk State men travelled to Baltimore and came away with two close road wins, 68-66 over Coppin State Saturday and 85-82 over Morgan State Monday. The Spartans (20-9, 10-2 MEAC) got good play from several players in the wins. Tyrese Jenkins had 21 points to lead the win vs. CSU with Chris Fields adding 13 points in 15 minutes off the bench. In the win at MSU, league scoring leader Jamarii Thomas led the Spartans with 20 points while Allen Bertrand added 18 points off the bench. Bertrand canned two free throws with :07 seconds left to get the win at CSU.

N. C. Central, Howard and S. C. State are two-games behind the Spartans at 7-4. The NSU women continue to lead the women's race at 13-1. Howard is next at 8-3.

In this week's schedule, NSU is at DelState Saturday and home to UMES Monday. Howard is at UMES Saturday and home vs. DelState Monday.

#### SIAC

Morehouse (22-5, 16-5) got two wins including a big 85-82 win over Benedict Saturday to tie Clark Atlanta (22-5, 16-5) atop the SIAC East at season's end. That's because Benedict came back to knock off CAU 93-91
