

CIAA CHAMPIONS CROWNED: SIAC, OVC, MEC AND CAA MEN IN TOURNAMENT PLAY THIS WEEK

TOURNAMENT FINALS RECAPS

CIAA MEN

Lincoln 54, Fayetteville State 51 BALTIMORE, MD - North Division top seed Lincoln (Pa.), one

of the founding members of the CIAA in 1912, won the program's firstever conference tournament hoops title with a come-from-behind 54-51 win over South Division top seed Fayetteville State Saturday at CFG Bank Arena. The win set off a wild celebration.

Lincoln (15-13) trailed 21-20 at the half and didn't take their first lead in the game until the 4:16 mark of the second half on two free throws by **Bakir Cleveland** to go up 42-40. Freshman **Chase Jackson** hit a big 3-pointer, his only basket of the game, with 1:30 left and the shot clock running down to put the Lions up 47-42. They held on to the lead and canned free throws down the stretch to salt away the win.

"We did what we said we were going to do a year ago, come back and win this championship," said Lincoln head coach Jason Armstrong in the postgame press conference. Lincoln lost in the 2023 championship game to Winston-Salem State, 57-52.

"It was wonderful to see our fans be here this whole week and cheer us on," Armstrong said. "We came back and did what we wanted to do. And now, we get ready for the NCAA Tournament."

Lincoln prevailed in the final behind the play of 6-9 junior back-up center Ethan Garita who led the Lions with 15 points while pulling down 5 rebounds. Garrita, who scored 4 points in the 76-62 semifinal win over Elizabeth City State and had 13 points and 4 rebounds in the 58-52 quarterfinal win over Claflin, came in for starting center and Tournament MVP Peter Sorber who was battling foul trouble.

Sorber was the defensive anchor to Lincoln's title run as he had four blocks in each of the Lions' three wins. He finished with 9 points, 6 rebounds and four blocks in the championship game after getting 8 points, 8 rebounds and 4 blocks vs. Claffin and 10 points, 8 rebounds and 4 blocks vs. ECSU.

Bakir Cleveland added 13 points in the championship game for Lincoln. Sorber and all-CIAA guard Reggie Hudson were named to the alltournament team. Caleb Simmons led FSU (18-13)

with 21 points. Tareill Fletcher added 10. Kaleb Coleman had 8 points and a team-high 12 rebounds.

(NOTE): Lincoln left the CIAA in 1980 and rejoined it in 2008.

CIAA WOMEN

Fayetteville State 64, Elizabeth City State 59

BALTIMORE, MD - South Division top seed Fayetteville State topped North Division top seed Elizabeth City State 64-59 to take the championship of the 50th CIAA Women's Basketball Tournament here Saturday afternoon.

FSU (27-2), ranked 12th in the latest national WBCA Top 25, completed a three-day run thru the tourney. The Lady Broncos won their quarterfinal (59-45 over **Bluefield State**) and semifinal (86-6) over Virginia State) games by double-digits but had to hold off a determined Lady Vikings' squad in the championship game.

Lane (13-13, 11-8 SIAC) claimed the number three seed in the division after Tuskegee (14-9, 11-8 SIAC) ended the season on a threegame losing streak landing the Golden Tigers in the fourth spot.

WOMEN - East Division

Host Savannah State (19-5, 15-4 SIAC) finished a strong regular season campaign to earn the top seed in the East.

Fort Valley State (14-10, 12-7 SIAC) earned the No. 2 seed with Clark Atlanta (14-11, 11-8 SIAC) third.

MEAC - Men

Howard got impressive performances from little-used 6-foot graduate guard Jordan Hairston in a 70-66 road win over Maryland-Eastern Shore Saturday and an 85-66 home win over Delaware State Monday. Hairston had team-highs of 19 points vs. UMES and 24 points vs. DelState as the Bison moved into a second-place tie with South Carolina State at 9-4, a half-game behind league-leader Norfolk State (10-3).

Each team will be looking for momentum headed into the tourney.

Five straight wins in SWAC play have propelled 13-3 Grambling State to the No. 1 spot in the men's standings with just two dates - Thursday, March 7 and Saturday, March 9 – left before the top eight teams go at it at the March 13-16 men's and women's tournaments at Birmingham's Bartow Arena. The G-Men have a two-game lead over Southern and Alcorn State who are at 11-5 and a two-and-a-half game lead over Texas Southern at 11-

Grambling closes this week on the road at Alabama A&M Thursday and Alabama State Saturday. Southern is at 'Bama State Thursday and A&M Saturday. Alcorn is at MVSU Thursday and UAPB Saturday while TSU hosts Prairie View Saturday.

SWAC - Women

Jackson State kept its SWAC ledger clean at 16-0 and clinched the top seed for next week's tournament with wins over Texas Southern (101-51) and Prairie View A&M (75-65). JSU hosts UAPB Thursday and MVSU Saturday to close out the regular season.

Grambling State is three games back at 10-3 followed by UAPB and Southern at 11-5.


