REPEAT CHAMPS IN MEAC; JSU, GRAMBLING TAKE SWAC CROWNS; LANGSTON, FAYETTEVILLE STATE ADVANCE

TOURNAMENT FINALS RECAPS

MEAC MEN

Howard 70, Delaware State 67

NORFOLK, VA - Fourth-seed Howard fought off a determined effort from sixth-seed Delaware State to prevail 70-67 and repeat as MEAC men's champion in the MEAC Basketball Tournament early Saturday afternoon at a cold Scope Arena

Howard (18-16), who knocked off top seed Norfolk State in the semifinals, led 40-34 at the break before DelState opened the second half on an 8-1 run capped by Jevin Muniz's 3-pointer that gave the Hornets (15-18) their first lead since early in the game at 42-41.

DSU built as much as a six-point lead at 55-49 with just under 11 minutes left before the Bison responded. They tied the game three times, the last time at 60-60 before going up 62-60 on a layup by **Bryce Harris** with 4:18 to play. From there, Howard stayed in front and was a perfect 8-of-8 from the free throw line to pull out the victory.

Howard got a team-high 18 points from tournament MVP, 6-1 grad senior

point guard Jordan Hairston. He finished with three of his four baskets from behind the arc and was 7 of 7 from the line. Nine of Hairston's 13 baskets in the three-day tournament were from long range. Junior forward Bryce Harris bullied his way to 16 points and canned clutch free throws in the waning moments. Twenty-six year old grad senior forward Seth Towns scored eight of Howard's first 17 points and also finished with 16 points and had a team-



high 8 rebounds. Sharp-shooting senior Marcus Dockery added 15 points as starters scored all but two of the Bison's total

Muniz had a game-high 24 points for DSU who also got 16 points and a team-best 8 rebounds from all-MEAC senior Martaz Robinson.

The Bison and fourth-year head coach Kenny Blakeney will head to the Big Dance, the NCAA men's tournament, for the second straight year and face NEC champion Wagner (16-15) in a First Four game Tuesday (see related story).

MEAC WOMEN

Norfolk State 51, Howard 48

NORFOLK, VA - Top-seed Norfolk State outscored second-seed Howard 18-10 in the fourth quarter to overcome a third-quarter deficit and pull out a 51-48 win in the women's championship game of the **MEAC** Tournament here Saturday afternoon.

The Lady Spartans (27-5), after leading most of the game including a 20-18 lead at the break, were outscored by the Bison 18-13 in the third guarter to trail 36-33 entering the final period. But that's when NSU Player of the Year, 6-1 junior forward Kierra Wheeler went to work.

She scored nine straight of her team-high 20 points, including a free throw with five minutes left that gave the Spartans a 42-41 lead they did not relinquish. Diamond Johnson's ensuing 3-pointer at the 4:23 mark increased the lead to 45-41. Howard (15-16) pulled within one point twice over the final minutes but could not overtake NSU. The Spartans knocked down 6 of 8 free throws to keep the Lady Bison at bay.

Johnson, named MVP of the tournament, struggled with 4 of 16 shooting and finished with 12 points, the only other double-figure scorer for NSU. The NC State transfer had 30 points and 11 rebounds in a 29-point semifinal blowout win over Coppin State and 19 points and 6 rebounds in a 32-point win over South Carolina State in the quarterfinals. Howard point quard Ivanna Warren was the

only double-digit scorer for the Lady Bison with 19 points. NSU and head coach Larry Vickers earned the MEAC's automatic berth into the women's NCAA Tournament for the second straight season. They will face Pac-12 runners-up Stanford (28-5) in a first round game on Friday (see

BIRMINGHAM, AL - Top seed Grambling State ran out to a 41-24 lead at halftime and was never headed in downing third-seed Texas Southern 75-66 to claim its first-ever men's title Saturday night at the SWAC Basketball Tournament here at Bartow Arena. TSU was seeking its fourth straight title.

The teams were tied at 13 early before GSU (20-14) finished the half on a 28-11 spurt. TSU (16-16) cut the lead to nine twice in the final seven minutes of the game and got as close as 7 at 73-66 with :30 seconds left.

GSU's 6-1 senior quard Tra'Michael Moton, who scored in double digits in all three of the Tigers' tourney wins, was named the Most Valuable Player. He had 10 points and a game-high 7 assists in the title game. He led GSU with 26 points and 6 rebounds in the semifinal win over Bethune-Cookman and tallied 14 points with 3 boards in a quarterfinal win over Alabama State. Jourdan Smith led GSU in the championship game with 20 points while Antwan Burnett had 14 and Jonathan Aku 12. TSU was led by 21 points from

Jonathan Cisse and 16 from Deon Stroud.

It is also the first tournament title and automatic NCAA berth for seventhyear Grambling head coach Donte' Jackson who will now take his Tigers' into a First Four game Wednesday vs. Montana State (17-17) (see related story).

SWAC WOMEN

Jackson State 68, Alcorn State 44

BIRMINGHAM, AL - Top-seed Jackson State completed a 21-0 run thru SWAC competition this season with a 68-44 win over Alcorn State in the women's tournament championship game here Saturday at Bartow Arena.

A 17-12 deficit in the first quarter of its 67-58 quarterfinal win over **Prairie** View A&M was the only time JSU (26-6) trailed at the end of a quarter during its run to the title. In the championship game, the Lady Tigers jumped out to a

17-8 lead after one period and led 33-12 at the break. Tournament MVP Andriana Avent, JSU's 6-foot senior guard who plays off the bench, led the way with 17 points. She tied for a team-high with 19 points in a semifinal win over Arkansas-Pine Bluff and had 11 points vs. PVA&M.

The balanced JSU attack got 13 points from Ti'lan Boler in the championship game and 11 from Hayleigh

Avent Breland. The 58-37 rebounding edge for Grambling was led by nine each from Miya Crump and Angel Jackson. Alcorn State (12-20), who came in as the tourney's 7th seed and knocked off No. 3 Grambling and No. 2 Southern, got 10 points each from Nakia Cheatham and Kiarra Henderson.

By virtue of the win, JSU earned the SWAC's automatic bid to the women's NCAA Tournament. The Lady Tigers will play at UConn (29-5) on Friday in a first round game (see related story).

Big Dance different for HBCU men, women

2024 MEAC AND SWAC BASKETBALL TOURNAMENTS' RESULTS

The men's tournament champions of the Mid Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC) Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) have a much different draw than their women counterparts heading into their respective NCAA "Big Dance" Div. I national tournaments this week.

The Men

MEAC men's champion Howard and **SWAC** men's champ **Grambling State** are both seeded 16th and last in their respective NCAA regions and will be involved in winnable play-in games – dubbed First Four games – early in the week.

Howard (18-16) won its second straight MEAC Tourney title, this time as a No. 4 seed. The Bison were awarded a First Four game Tuesday (6:40 p.m.) in Dayton, Ohio in the West Region vs. NEC champion Wagner (16-15). The Seahawks grabbed their league title as a No. 6 seed. The winner of the Howard/Wagner game will face the region's top seed, North Carolina, Thursday in Charlotte, N.C. (2:45 p.m.)

The Bison, making their second appearance under now fourth-year head coach Kenny Blakeney, were given a 16-seed a year ago and faced West Region top seed Kansas in the first round (a 96-68 loss). This is Howard's fifth appearance overall in the NCAA Tournament.

Grambling (20-14), under seventh-year head coach Donte' Jackson, won its first-ever SWAC men's tourney title as a No. 1 seed and earned the program's first-ever NCAA berth.

The G-Men drew Big Sky champion Montana State (17-17), who won its tournament title as a No. 5 seed, in a First Four Midwest Region game. Their match up is Wednesday in Dayton at 6:40 p.m. The GSU/MSU winner will face the region's top seed Purdue (29-4) on Friday in Indianapolis at 7:25 p.m.

The Ladies

Like Grambling's men, both SWAC women's champion Jackson State (26-6) and MEAC women's champion Norfolk State (27-5) emerged as winners of their tournaments as No. 1 seeds. Unlike Grambling however, the ladies were not seeded 16th or last in their respec-

And unlike Grambling or Howard, the ladies will be facing perennial national powers when they open play on Friday.

Jackson State, under sixth-year head coach Tomekia Reed, is making its third NCAA appearance in four years. The Lady Tigers earned a program-best No. 14 seed in the Portland 4

They will face Big East Tournament champion and perennial national power, No. 3 UConn (29-5) with Hall of Fame head coach Gino

Auriemma Friday (1 p.m.) on the Lady Huskies home court in Storrs, Connecticut.

UConn has won 11 national championships under Auriemma but enters Friday's game with maybe eight healthy players. Don't count out the deep JSU squad.

The Lady Broncos (29-2), the second-seed in the region, faced region top seed Gannon (34-2) at 5 p.m. The winner advances to the women's Div. II Elite Eight (national quarterfinals) at the St. Joseph Civic Arena in St. Joseph, Missouri, March 25, 27 and 29.

Langston won two blowout games in the NAIA's Duer Quadrant to advance to the national Sweet 16 in Kansas City. Missouri on Friday. The No. 2 32-1 Lions will face off against No. 12 LSU Shreveport (24-8) in the 1 p.m. contest. Langston is behind only 32-1 top seed Grace (Ind.) in the NAIA seeding.
