HBCU FOOTBALL LEGEND PORTER PASSES:

College Football Hall of Famer Doug Porter, who was head coach at Mississippi Valley



State, Howard and had two stints at Fort Valley State, passed on Sunday. He was 94 years old.

Porter, who hailed from Mississippi, started his collegiate career playing the quarterback position at Xavier of **Louisiana** before enlisting in the U.S. Army. He began his college coaching career when he took over the head coaching position at

MVSU from 1961-65. The next year, he joined the staff of legendary coach Eddie G. Robinson as an assistant at Grambling State University, where he stayed until 1973. He became a head coach again when he joined Howard University from 1974-78. Porter coached at Fort Valley State University from 1979 to 1985 and then again from 1987 to 1996.

Porter, had been the oldest living member of the College Football Hall of Fame.

While coaching at Fort Valley, Porter won the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (SIAC) Coach of the Year seven times while operating as the athletic director for 16 years. He was chairman of the Division II Football Committee and president of the National Athletic Steering Committee.

He was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2008 and the FVSU Athletics Hall of Fame in 2009. Porter's funeral service is scheduled for June 15 at St. Benedict Catholic Church in Grambling, La.

HAMILTON TO HEAD SC HALL OF FAME: COLUMBIA, S.C. - Bill Hamilton, the legendary

publicist and historian from South Carolina State University, has been

"I am honored to serve as president of the South Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame," said Hamilton. "The Hall enjoys a storied past and has a bright future as it continues to honor those individuals who have contributed to the great athletic legacy in South Carolina and throughout the

Hamilton, who was reared in Chesterfield, S.C. and graduated from S.C. State, retired in 2013 after 40 years as the only full-time sports information director in SCSU history, beginning his career in July 1973. He remains active with SCSU athletics as the college's athletic historian and as a football broadcaster. In 2009, he was enshrined in the CoSIDA (College Sports Information Directors Association) Hall of Fame and in 2012, was the recipient of the SCAHOF's annual Herman Helms Excellence in Media Award.

Former SC State head football coach Willie Jeffries (2009) is a former president of the organization. Hamilton is replacing Jeff May of Greenwood and Lander University.

Another tough finish for Timothy O'Neal on Champions Tour

The ups and downs of former Jackson State golfer Timothy O'Neal on the PGA Champions Tour continued last week.

The 51-year old Savannah, Ga. native, the only African-American on the Champions Tour, shot a final round 4-over 76 Sunday to finish in a tie with six others for 31st at -2, 214 at Madison, Wisconsin's American Family Insurance Cham-

His disappointing finish came after a promising start to the tour-

He entered Sunday's final round at 6-under par, tied for fourth with Jerry Kelly before posting his worst score of the three-day event.

O'Neal was tied for eighth after a 2-under 70 in Friday's first round. He followed that up Saturday with a 4-under 68 to enter the final round just three strokes behind leaders Ernie Els and Wisconsin native and host Steve Stricker who were at -9.

an eagle and three birdies on the five par-5 holes at the University Ridge Golf Course but he bogeyed his 18th and final hole.

O'Neal had two double-bogeys and one bogey against just one birdie in Sunday's final round.

Els won the tournament on the first hole of a playoff over Stricker. This week O'Neal won

\$16,160 for his 31st-place finish. In Saturday's round, O'Neal carded So far this season over 12 events

 halfway thru the season – he has won \$104,432.

He entered last week's AFIC event 71st in the Charles Schwab Cup Money standings and stayed at 71st after his finish. The top 72 players advance to the Schwab Cup Championship playoffs which will be held the first weekend in November (Nov. 7-10) in Phoenix.

O'Neal's best finish so far this season was a tie for 19th at the Insperity Classic in May, his only top 25 result of the year. He also had his best payday there as he pocketed \$28,417.50.

Since joining what was formerly called the Seniors Tour in 2022, O'Neal has fashioned three top 10 finishes and pocketed \$614,276 in prize money thru 37 events. That three-year total far surpasses anything he has garnered in his 27-year pro career.

He got exemptions into two events in his inaugural Champions season (2022) before earning full status thru Q-School qualification

In 2023, he finished 44th on the Schwab Money List with \$490,470 after competing in all 24

O'Neal has had an up and down professional career after starring at JSU from 1993 to 1997. He won 16 collegiate golf tournaments while playing for the Tigers and had the nation's lowest scoring average during his senior season. He led JSU to its first-ever NCAA championship appearance in 1995. He also won the Georgia Amateur Championship in 1997.

As a professional, he has played in tournaments and on competition all around the world including the Korn Ferry, PGA Tour Latinoamérica and Web.com Tours. He has won seven professional events on four continents: North America, Europe, Africa and South America.

He is also known for his heartbreaking failures at PGA Tour Q School, where he missed earning a PGA Tour card by a single stroke on two occasions.

HBCU All-Star hoopers heading to Paris

Travis Williams continues to break new ground for HBCU basketball.

Ten HBCU All-Stars alumni will embark on introducing HBCUs to an international audience with the first-ever HBCU All-Stars International Tour to Paris, France. The excursion begins Wednesday, June 19, to June 26, as several of the nation's top HBCU All-Stars will

"This is one of the most important and rare moments in history where we get a once-in-alifetime opportunity and global platform during the Olympic year in Paris to represent our esteemed HBCUs, four premier Black College conferences, the Best in Black College Basketball, and the United States of America in a part of the world where HBCUs and the HBCU culture do not exist," said Travis L. Williams, Founder and CEO of HBCU All Stars LLC.

Alums from the 2022, 2023, and 2024 HBCU All-Star Games in New Orleans, Houston, and Phoenix will be partake in the *Quai* 54 World Streetball Championship at the prestigious Pierre de Coubertin Stadium in Paris. Celebrities and even NBA stars will travel overseas to enjoy the annual basketball tournament, which sold out in less than two hours.

"This is history in the making to host the first-ever HBCU All-Stars International Tour in Paris, one month before the 2024 Summer Olympics take place," Williams said. "The very deserving 10 players that have been selected from our 2022, 2023, and 2024 HBCU All-Star Games are playing professionally now in the NBA G-League, internationally overseas, and doing well in pursuing their goals, dreams, and aspirations of playing at the highest level in the

"They are truly excited to represent the HBCU All-Stars Basketball Movement, and the best in college basketball from our country's most esteemed HBCUs."

Legendary former HBCU coach Cy Alexander will serve as the head coach of the allstar squad, bringing a wealth of valuable experience, knowledge, expertise, and respect.

"I am very honored and humbled to be asked to be a part of such an historic event," said Alexander, who led programs at South Carolina State, Tennessee State and North Carolina A&T during an impressive 45-year HBCU coaching career that included six NCAA Tournament appearances. "Travis Williams has done an outstanding job establishing the HBCU All-Star Brand. We plan to compete at a very high level and try to win the tournament."

BCSP Spring Round-Up

Points few and far between for HBCU athletes, programs at NCAA Div. I Track Outdoors

EUGENE, OR - Only three black college athletes scored points at last week's NCAA Div. I Outdoor Track & Field Championships.

Arkansas-Pine Bluff high jumper Caleb Snowden, Howard high hurdler Samuel Bennett and Alabama State sprinter Jamarion Stubbs were the only HBCU athletes to finish in the top eight to earn points – and first team all-American status – in their respective events (See STAT COR-NER).



Snowden, a 6-6 senior and two-time SWAC high jump champion, had the best finish. He placed third in the high jump with a clearance of 2.23 meters (7 feet, 3 3/4 inches), the same height as Nebraska's Tyus Wilson. Snowden earned six points for UAPB. Romain Beckford of Arkansas won the event with his season's best height of 2.26 meters (7 feet, 5 inches). Snowden entered the competition tied with Beckford for

the best jump of the season. Earlier this year, at the NCAA Indoor Championships, Snowden made history by becoming the first student-athlete in UAPB program history to

be named an All-American since joining the NCAA. Additionally, Snowden is the first high jumper from an HBCU to

achieve a top-three position in both the NCAA Indoor and Outdoor Championships in the same year. He finished second in the indoor championshps with a leap of 2.24 meters (7 feet, 4 1/4 inches) behind Beckford (2.27 meters, 7 feet, 5 1/4 inches).



Howard graduate student Bennett, from the United Kingdom, saved his best performance in the 110-meter hurdles final. Bennett wrapped up the season with a sixth-place finish, clocking in at a personal best 13.45 seconds, while becoming the first Bison in more than 20 years to score points (three) at the national stage.

Additionally, he earned All-American first team honors, becoming the first men's All-American since former Bison standout and current Howard Director of Track & Field David Oliver (2003).

Stubbs placed seventh overall in the 200-meter dash with a time of 20.59 to earn two points for the Hornets. The Las Vegas native also earned First Team All-American honors for earning a top-eight finish.

He will return to Oregon's Hayward Field in a couple of weeks and compete for an opportunity to represent the United States in the 200-meter dash at the Paris Summer Olympics.
