CIAA LEGEND AL CARTER PASSES:



RALEIGH, NC - Dr. Alfonza Carter, a graduate and former basketball player at North Carolina A&T State University who spent 40 years as a coach and administrator at Shaw University passed last week on Wednesday, August 9. He was 73.

Carter was an iconic administrator Carter at Shaw including more than two decades as its athletics director

before retiring in 2020. The Bears and Lady Bears experienced unparalleled success under his leadership, winning numerous CIAA titles combined in several sports including football, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's tennis, baseball, women's bowling, men's and women's cross country, softball and women's volleyball.

The tennis and women's basketball programs emerged as CIAA powerhouses under Carter's reign as athletic director. The men and women netters have combined for 22 conference crowns and the women hoopsters have claimed nine CIAA titles and a NCAA Division II national championship.

Carter also oversaw the reinstatement of football after nearly three decades of absence. In only its second year as a varsity sport, the football team captured the CIAA title in 2004 and went on to win three more conference crowns in the following six years.

The 2010-11 season may have been the most fruitful for Shaw athletics under Carter. The Bears and Lady Bears brought home championship trophies in football, men's basketball, women's basketball and men's tennis. In the first ten years of the 21st century, the Shaw athletic program was the only one in the CIAA to have at least one championship in each year.

In 2011, Carter was presented with the Doctor of Humane Letters from Shaw. Under his direction, Shaw captured the CIAA's Jeanette A. Lee Athletic Achievement Award in 2006 for outstanding administration and achievement for an athletic program.

Carter received lifetime recognition for his accomplishments. He is a member of both the CIAA and Shaw Athletic Halls of Fame.

Before he became a legendary athletic director, Carter was an accomplished head coach in women's basketball, men's basketball and tennis. He served five seasons as head women's basketball coach at Shaw, posting a 73-50 overall record and winning the CIAA Southern Division title. In 1987, Carter moved to the men's side as its head coach. During his four seasons at the helm, the Bears earned their first 20-win season in nearly two decades. In addition to his coaching accolades, Carter was named Vice President for Administrative Services in 2012.

A native of Martinsville, Va., Carter, grew up in the shadows of the CIAA. He was a 1973 graduate of NC A&T where he was an All-American basketball standout playing for legendary head coach Cal Irvin as the Aggies moved from the CIAA to the MEAC. His basketball exploits eventually landed Carter in the N.C. A&T Hall of Fame.

After graduation from A&T, Carter served as head freshman basketball coach and physical education instructor for the Fairfax County Public Schools System. He then returned to his alma mater and became assistant men's basketball coach and instructor of health and physical education prior to his 40-year tenure at Shaw University.

Four HBCUs enter 2023 in Top 25

North Carolina Central and Florida A&M in the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) and Benedict and Virginia Union in NCAA Div. II football are ranked in the Top 25 of the preseason Football American Coaches Association (AFCA) polls.

The polls are voted on by all coaches from the respective divisions.

MEAC Defending Celebration Bowl champion NC Central is ranked 19th in the inaugural FCS poll. The Eagles finished 10-2 overall a year ago and won the MEAC with a 4-1 record. They defeated SWAC champion Jackson State 41-34 in overtime to win the Celebration Bowl.

The Eagles' losses a year ago were at Campbell (48-18) and at South Carolina State (26-24). NCCU beat New Hampshire 45-27 last season. New Hampshire is ranked 12th in the 2023 preseason

Florida A&M, who finished 9-2 preseason No. 1. last year and behind Jackson State in the SWAC East, is ranked 25th in included **Bowie State** (53), the FCS poll.

Others receiving votes included Jackson State (37), North Carolina A&T (13) and Howard (5). Defending FCS champion South Dakota State is the preseason FCS No. 1.

In the Div. II preseason poll, **SIAC** champion **Benedict** is 17th followed by Virginia Union at

Benedict ran the table in the SIAC (10-0) and went 11-0 overall in the 2022 regular season. The Tigers were the top seeded team in Super Region II but suffered its only loss in a second round playoff game to Wingate (23-6).

Virginia Union finished 9-2 overall and second to Chowan at 4-1 in the CIAA North. The Panthers lost in a first round Div. II 20 playoff game to Wingate (32-7).

Wingate is 21st in the 2023 preseason poll. Defending Div. II champion Ferris State is the 25

Black College Player of the Year 2023 Watch List unveiled

Atlanta, GA - The *Black College Football Hall of Fame* (BCFHOF) announced Tuesday the 2023 Watch List for the Black College Football Player of the Year Award. The Award is presented annually to the most outstanding football player from a Historically Black College & University.

The initial list is comprised of 49 players from 26 different HBCUs. Included in the list is 2022 black college rushing leader Jada Byers of Virginia Union, the CIAA's offensive player of the year, MEAC offensive player of the year and MVP of the Celebration Bowl, North Carolina Central quarterback Davius Richard, SWAC and FCS tackles leader, linebacker Colton Adams of Alabama State and SIAC and black college sacks leader Loobert Denelus of league champion Benedict.

Four finalists will be unveiled after the season. The winner of the Black College Football Player of the Year Award, which will be announced during halftime of the 2024 Allstate *HBCU Legacy Bowl*, will be presented with the *Deacon Jones Trophy*. The Allstate HBCU Legacy Bowl takes place on Saturday, February 24, 2024 in New Orleans, Louisiana. The game will be broadcast live on NFL Network.

Former North Carolina A&T running back Tarik Cohen was selected as the inaugural recipient of the Award in 2016; **Bowie State** quarterback Amir Hall was the 2017 and 2018 recipient; former Tennessee State wide receiver Chris Rowland was the 2019 recipient; former Alabama **A&M** QB **Ageel Glass** was the recipient in the Spring 2021 and Fall 2021 seasons; and former Jackson State QB Shedeur Sanders was the 2022 winner of the Award.

"The *Deacon Jones Trophy* is the most prestigious football award for HBCUs," said BCFHOF co-founder and 2012 inductee James Harris. "Deacon Jones was a pioneer and an icon, and still to this day represents the very best of Black College Football."

BCSP Editor The 104th NFL season kicked off its 2023 preseason last week with some 43 HBCU players in camps. The first preseason games ran between Thursday, August 10 and Sunday, August 13 and produced

some interesting results for those players. None was more impactful than Green Bay Packers running back Emmanuel Wilson. The 5-11, 226-pound rookie free agent out of Fort Valley State had perhaps the biggest day for any NFL player in the week with his performance Friday.

Wilson ran for 111 yards on just six carries and had 80- and 11yard TD runs as the Packers defeated Cincinnati 36-19. Wilson was performing 14 years to the day after losing his father.

The talented back was originally signed out of FVSU by the Denver Broncos but was released in May and picked up by Green Bay. He is reportedly battling with third-year pro Patrick Taylor and Iowa grad Tyler Goodson for the third running back spot for the Packers behind starter Aaron James and back-up A. J. Dillon.

His output Friday could not be ignored by Packers' head coach Matt LeFleur.

"That was by far the best I would say he's looked," LaFleur said, "Any time you rip off an 80-yarder, I'd say that's a good deal. ... It was a big night for him. Fourteen years ago, he lost his father. So I was really happy for him coming out in his debut and rips off over 100 yards and two touchdowns."

Wilson, a Charlotte, N.C. native, has produced at every step along his journey. He began his collegiate career at Johnson C. Smith in his hometown. As a freshman there in 2019, he ran for 1,040 yards (104.0 ypg.) and 13 TDs.

He transferred to FVSU for the 2021 season and topped the SIAC with 835 rushing yards in seven games averaging 5.7 yards per carry and 119.3 yards per game with 7 TDs.

He was the leading rusher last season in the SIAC with 1,371

yards. He averaged 6.6 yards per carry and 137.1 rushing yards per game while scoring 17 rushing touchdowns. Wilson only finished behind Virginia Union's Jada Byers' 1,920 yards, 174.5 yards per game and 19 TDs in black college rushing yards. Wilson was also second to Byers in all-purpose yards (204.4 ypg. to 161.0 ypg.) and scoring (126 points, 21 TDs, 11.5 points per game to 102 points, 17 TDs, 10.2 ppg.).
