SOUTH REGION - FIRST FOUR - MEN 16) Alabama State 70, 16) Saint Francis 68

DAYTON, OH – Six-three sophomore guard Amarr Knox got March Madness

off to a rousing start as his lay up after a full-court pass with :01 seconds left allowed SWAC men's tournament champion Alabama State to pull out a 70-68 win over Northeast Conference champion Saint Francis in the opening game of the 2025 NCAA Div. I Tournament.

Knox finished with a team-high 16 points. Anthony "TJ" Madlock had 11 and Hines 10. Micah Simpson, who threw the long pass, finished with 9.

It was the first NCAA tournament win for Alabama State (20-15) and head coach Tony Madlock

LEXINGTON, KY - South Region and overall top seed Auburn (29-5) pulled away from a 10-point halftime lead to knock off SWAC champion Alabama State 83-63 Thursday

ASU (20-16) stayed close most of the first half. After trailing by 13 at 26-13, the Hornets pulled within one, at 32-31 on a layup by Amarr Knox with 1:48 left in the half. Auburn closed the period on a 9-0 run to lead 41-31 at the break.

The Hornets closed to within nine early in the second half before the Tigers moved out to a double-digit lead that they maintained for the rest of the game. Knox had 18 points and T. J. Madlock had 11 to lead ASU.

1. NORFOLK STATE (24-11) - Tied for MEAC regular season title (with SC State) and won the tournament title over the Bulldogs to earn third NCAA bid under Robert Jones. Disappointing 16th seed lost to No. 1 Florida in first round of NCAA West Regional

2. South Carolina State (20-13) - In second year under Erik Martin, Bulldogs won 11 straight at season's end to tie Norfolk State for the MEAC regular season title and then battled the Spartans to a 67-66 loss in the MEAC Tourney final. Bulldogs should have advanced to postseason play

BCSP Notes Larry Vickers leaves Norfolk State

This season, his Norfolk State squad won a record 30 games (30-5), went 17-0 against Mid-Eastern

at Auburn of the Southeastern Conference (SEC).

Vickers Athletic Conference (MEAC) competition and posted wins over two SEC teams, Missouri (57-54, on Nov. 10) and Auburn (63-57, on Dec. 29). They received a 13 seed, the highest for an HBCU in the last decade, and battled No. 4 Maryland for four quarters Saturday before bowing 82-69.

That win in December, as well as NSU's outstanding play under Vickers, obviously caught the eye of the Auburn folks.

"Throughout the search process, one name continually rose to the top - Larry Vickers," Auburn athletic director John Cohen said in a statement released by the university. "Coach Vickers has an incredible technical understanding of women's basketball. He demands excellence from his student-athletes while fostering an environment for young women to succeed. His understanding of the new landscape of college athletics is impressive. No one has worked harder for an opportunity like this than Coach Vickers. I am excited to welcome LV, Charisse, and their family to the Plains."

Vickers, a former NSU men's basketball player and assistant coach, led the women's program for the past 10 seasons, collecting a 177-99 record and the last three Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC) tournament titles and NCAA berths.

"I want to thank President Roberts, John Cohen and the entire search committee for this incredible opportunity to lead the Auburn women's basketball program," Vickers said. "Auburn is a great institution with one of the best athletics programs in the country. I am excited to get to work and help bring championship-level success to our women's basketball program."

Vickers' salary at Norfolk State was \$214,200, making him the highestpaid women's basketball coach in the MEAC.

According to recent data, coaches outside of the top women's coaches in the SEC such as South Carolina's Dawn Staley (\$4 million) and LSU's Kim Mulkey (\$3.26 million), typically earn between \$650,000 to \$1.5 million annually. Vickers' salary is likely to fall within that range. Auburn's previous coach, Johnnie Harris, earned \$568,750 per year.

Reggie Barlow named new head football coach at Tennessee State

NASHVILLE — Former HBCU and NFL standout player, HBCU

and professional standout head coach Reggie Barlow will be introduced Monday as the 23rd head football coach at Tennessee State.

Barlow will be replacing former Heisman Trophy winner and NFL standout Eddie George who left after four years leading the Blue Tigers including leading them to an FCS playoff appearance in 2024. George was announced two weeks ago as the head football coach at Bowling

Barlow joins TSU after a standout two-year tenure as head coach of the UFL's D.C. Defenders, where he led the team to a league-best 9-1 record and a championship game appearance in 2023. His remarkable leadership earned him 2023 XFL Coach of the Year honors.

"Unbelievable! The chance to be at Tennessee State University, with its rich history, tradition, and legacy of amazing players and coaches – it's truly an honor to follow in their footstep," said Barlow. "I'm humbled, blessed, and beyond excited! A huge thank you to Director of Athletics Dr. Mikki Allen, President Tucker, and the student-athletes who have who've remained committed through uncertainty. And to Big Blue, I'm ready to get started! So, let me ask you...do you like football?"

Before his success with the Defenders, Barlow served as head coach at Virginia State University for six seasons leading the Trojans to a 34-15 overall record, 25-10 in CIAA play. He made history in 2017 leading the

Trojans to their first unbeaten season in school history and winning the Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association (CIAA) title. His efforts earned him CIAA Coach of the Year honors.

Barlow began his collegiate coaching career at his alma mater Alabama State as quarterback coach for two seasons and head coach for eight seasons. During his time at the helm, he led the Hornets to a 49-42 record and three SWAC East Division titles. His influence went beyond wins and losses, as his teams also excelled in the classroom, boasting an 80% graduation rate.

As a player, Barlow was a standout wide receiver and return specialist at Alabama State before being selected in the fourth round of the 1996 NFL Draft by the Jacksonville Jaguars. During his NFL career, he played for the Jaguars, Oakland Raiders, and Tampa Bay Buccaneers, leading the league in punt return yards in 1998 and earning a Pro Bowl alternate selection. He capped his playing career by winning Super Bowl XXXVII with the Buccaneers in 2002.

"Reggie Barlow's appointment as the head football coach of TSU is a testament to his dedication to the game of football and his deep-rooted passion for developing young athletes. With a rich legacy as a player and coach, Barlow is poised to lead the TSU football program to new heights, building a culture of excellence and success that will benefit both the players and the university for years to come," said Allen.

Barlow inherits a TSU program on the rise and is eager to defend its share of the OVC-Big South Championship. The Tigers reached the NCAA FCS Playoffs for the first time since 2013 and claimed their first conference title since 1999. TSU will play eight home games in 2025 beginning with the John Merritt Classic on August 30th against North Carolina A&T.

The press conference to introduce Coach Barlow took place at Nissan Stadium on Monday, March 24 at 11 AM.

Bussie joins CSU following a standout tenure as the head coach at Alcorn State University, where he led the Braves to back-to-back Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC)

regular-season championships in 2022 and 2023. He was named SWAC Coach of the Year in both seasons, solidifying his reputation as one of the top coaching minds in college basketball.

"In our search for a head coach, we prioritized leadership, excellence, and a relentless drive to compete at the highest level, Coach Bussie embodies these qualities and more.," said Vice President and Director of Intercollegiate Athletics Dr. Monique Carroll. Before his time at Alcorn State, Bussie spent five seasons as an assistant coach at Prairie View A&M University, helping guide the Panthers to multiple SWAC championships and an NCAA Tournament appearance. His coaching career also includes successful stops at Xavier University of Louisiana, where he played a key role in the program's sustained success.

Bussie, a Baltimore, Maryland native, earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees from Xavier University of Louisiana. His experience in player development, recruiting, and program building will be instrumental as he takes the reins at Chicago State.
