rookie mini-camps to secure spots on NFL preseason 90man rosters.

Sanders and Williams were among 10 black college rookies that received mini-camp invites, three-day events held during the first or second weekend of May following the NFL draft. These minicamps are designed to acclimate newly drafted players and undrafted free agents to the team's systems and help them learn the playbook. They also serve as an evaluation period for coaches to assess the rookies' potential. Some teams have not finished their evaluations. Drafted players are on the 90-day rosters while those undrafted have to earn a spot.

Sanders, the less ballyhooed son of former JSU and present Colorado head coach Deion "Coach Prime" Sanders, is a safety who impressed in his invitation to the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' mini-camp. He agreed to a threeyear deal worth \$2.96 million, according to sportrac, a standard contract for rookie UDFAs (including Williams) without a signing bonus. He'll wear No. 28 for the Bucs, departing from the iconic No. 21 he wore at Colorado and his father donned during his storied NFL career.

Williams, the MEAC's 2024 Defensive Player of the Year, earned a spot after his stint at the Minnesota Vikings mini-camp. After the minicamp, the Vikings invited Williams and edge rusher Matt Harmon out of Kent State. Williams will wear No. 69.

Sanders was in 54 games (36 starts) while playing at South Carolina, Jackson State and Colorado. He finished his career with 229 tackles, six interceptions, and forced an impressive nine fumbles. While at Colorado, he forced four fumbles, picked off one pass, and returned both an interception and a fumble for touchdowns, showcasing his

#### Fieldings takes sixth at

NCAA Charlottesville Regional

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. - Howard sophomore Paris Fieldings (Chesapeake, Va.) saw her historic run come to an end at the NCAA Charlottesville Regional after taking sixth individually.

The three-day event (May 5-7) took place at the Birdwood Golf Course (par-71, 6,365 yards) in Charlottesville, Va.

On Day Three, the Virginia native shot 5-over par (76) with a pair of birdies on the back nine. Totally, she fired 24-over par (237).

For Fieldings, she concludes her first season as the program's first golfer to win the conference tournament and NEC (Northeast Conference) Player of the Year.

#### NC A&T ladies, Prokhorova win PGA Works titles

KHOLER, Wis. - The North Carolina A&T women's golf team won the PGA Works Championship last Wednesday, and the Aggies also had the top medalist in junior Ekaterina Prokhorova.

A&T junior Polina Marina placed second. The ladies shot a three-round 302-295-337—934 to win the tournament at the par 72, 5,287-yard historic Whistling Straits - Irish golf course by one stroke over Howard. The Lady Bison who shot a final-round 323 to erase a 14shot deficit from Tuesday to make Wednesday's finish one of the most exciting in the history of the event.

Prokhorova claimed the individual title by shooting 71-73-82-226 to finish at 10-over par. On a windy day that resulted in higher scoring, Prokhorova's teammate Marina shot 84 to finish three shots off the lead after a three-round 77-68-84—229. Howard's Marley Franklin rounded out the top three by shooting 74-78-79-231 to finish 15-over.

#### Smith leads Howard men's golf thru two rounds of NCAA regional

AMHERST, Va.-Howard University men's golf team remains in 13th place after round two of the NCAA Amherst Regional, hosted by Liberty University and held at the Poplar Grove Golf Course (par-70, 7,212 yards) in Amherst, Va

On Day Two, HU shot 26-over par (306). After two rounds, the Bison are 50-over par (610) with 18 holes remaining.

Fifth-year senior Marcus Smith Jr. (Rockford, Ill.) continues to spearhead the Bison, firing 6-over par (76) with three birdies in round two. After 36 holes, the Illinois native is 8-over par (148) and tied for 53rd overall.

## Top seed Howard takes MEAC softball crown; Heads to Duke

NORFOLK. Va. — Top-seed Howard claimed the 2025 Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC) softball championship with a 6-1 victory over sixth-seeded South Carolina State Saturday at the NSU Softball Field.

Head Coach Tori Tyson was named the

tournament's Most Outstanding Coach while Ameenah **Ballenger** was the tournament Most Outstanding Player.

Ballenger, a grad senior who pitches (12-5) and plays shortstop, hit safely in all three Ballenger tournament wins for Howard. was the winning pitcher in relief in two of the

wins and drove in runs in all three.

The win marks Howard's first MEAC title since 2022 and secures the Bison an automatic berth in the 2025 NCAA Softball Tournament.

The Lady Bison (31-18) will face No. 14 seed Duke in the opening round of the Durham Regional. First pitch is scheduled for 12 p.m. ET on Friday, May 16, and will air live on the ACC Network. The double-elimination regional format also features Coastal Carolina University and the University of Georgia.

## Jackson State prevails in SWAC softball tourney; In Alabama Regional

GULFPORT, Miss.- Jackson State took a 2-1 lead in the second inning and never surrendered the lead on the way to a 3-1 win against Florida A&M on Sunday to claim its second straight SWAC Softball title.

Sophomore pitcher Brooklyn Morris (13-

8) got the win for JSU and was named tourney MVP after going seven innings, giving up one run on five hits, allowing three walks and striking out one in the finale. She posted three complete game wins in the tournament, giving up one



earned run in two wins and two earned runs in the other.

JSU will play in the Tuscaloosa Regional hosted by the University of Alabama and be joined at Rhoads Stadium by Alabama, Virginia Tech and Belmont.

Play begins Friday, May 16 at 2:30 p.m. CT with Belmont (40-14) facing Virginia Tech (41-11) before Alabama (37-21) and Jackson State (29-23) face off at 5:00 p.m. CT. Both games will be streamed live on ESPN+.

## **Cedric Baker to lead SC State** women's basketball program

ORANGEBURG, S.C. - Veteran and championship coach Cedric Baker has been named the new South Carolina State head women's basketball coach during a press conference May 6 by Interim Athletics Director Oliver "Buddy" Pough.

> "At this pivotal moment in the future of our women's basketball program, we believe Coach Baker is the right person to lead us forward," Pough said. "His experience, vision and values align with our mission of developing student-athletes who excel on and off the court."

Baker joins SC State after an extraordinary 22-year tenure at Savannah State, where he built a program defined by excellence, discipline, and historic achievement claiming 262 wins overall. Prior to his time at SSU, Baker compiled a 55-19 record at **Benedict** and was 139-86 in seven years leading the women at his alma mater, Voorhees. At Voorhees his teams earned four EIAC championships and three NAIA Division I national tournament appearances.

"I'm excited to join the South Carolina State family and eager to begin building something special with the student-athletes, staff, and supporters

"His passion for developing student-athletes, his proven leadership, and his vision for the future of our program made this an easy decision. During his time as acting head coach, James demonstrated exceptional leadership, fostering a culture of resilience, hard work, and teamwork. His dedication to player development, both on and off the court, earned the respect of the team, the athletic department, and the Valley community.

He compiled a 6-12 SWAC record, tying two other teams for eighth in the conference standings, and an 8-23 overall record this season as interim head coach

Williams, at 6-3, 270 pounds, posted 11.0 sacks, 32 total tackles (22 solo), 15.0 tackles for loss, three interceptions, one pass breakup, one forced fumble, and one fumble recovery en route to winning the MEAC's top defensive award this season. He racked up a total of 52 tackles for a loss and 31 sacks in 42 games in his fouryear career. Noted for his relentless motor and pass rushing skills, Williams was one of the standouts at the HBCU Combine and HBCU Legacy Bowl in New Orleans. His pressure rate was 10.38% during his time in college, which is very intriguing.

Both hope they can crack their team's 53-man roster or their 16-man practice squad come Week 1 of the NFL season

#### Mississippi Valley removes acting tag from women's basketball head coach Jason James

#### Florida Memorial mens basketball coach steps down

The Florida Memorial men's basketball team is now in the market for a head coach following reports that current position holder Delano Thomas is stepping down from the role.

Thomas was hired by Florida Memorial in March 2023, filling a role left vacant by previous coach Ansar Al-Ameen, who left to take a job as an assistant coach with the University of Nebraska at Omaha women's basketball team.

In his two seasons at Florida Memorial, Thomas led the Lions to a 47-15 overall record, securing a berth in the NAIA National Tournament each year. His first season with the Lions saw him help the team improve from a 14-14 overall record and a 5-11 record in the Sun Conference the previous year to a 24-7 overall record and a 9-5 conference record.

In addition to leading Florida Memorial to its first 20-win season in over a decade, Thomas also coached the team to a Sun Conference Tournament championship.

Before coming to Florida Memorial, Thomas served as the head coach at Shawnee State, where he won the Don Meyer National Coach of the Year award and led the team to its first NAIA National Championship in school history.
